Public Space and the Transition into
Private Architecture



Society today has become a culture of commuters working their way through life. As individuals we live in large cities consumed with man-made landscapes. Where does private property take on the functions of public landscape? How is public space defined and where is the transition from this designed exterior environment to the private interior of the architectural form?

The presentation will be a discussion of four different approaches to transitional space including the interactive space surrounding the building, following the pathway inside and the interior spatial experience. Research locations included London, Amsterdam, Rotterdam, Utrecht and Bruxelles.

Class of '73 Traveling Fellowship Recipients are students in their fourth year of undergraduate study or second year of graduate study. The fellowship is awarded annually to students for research on the subject of architectural history during the summer prior to their final year of course work. Recipients must produce a document to be catalogued in the architecture Library as a permanent record of the research, as well as make a public presentation of their work to the school.
